Enrollment Options at LSCPA

SEMESTER OPTIONS

16-Week Semester

Traditionally a long-term Fall or Spring semester that covers course content over a 16-week period.

8-Week Semester

Taught during Spring and Fall semesters, allows for the accelerated course delivery in an 8-week period.

6-Week Semester

Taught during summer session, our 6-week semester accelerates course content to cover 16 weeks of information in a 6-week period.

13-Day Mini Semester

Mini semester classes are shortened and intense classes that are occur between full term semesters that condense course information to a 13-day period.

INSTRUCTIONAL OPTIONS

Face-to-Face Instruction

Traditional instruction occurs in a classroom setting. Students attend class two to three times a week. Classroom lectures, demonstrations and homework assignments are common in these courses.

Online Courses

Students will log in to their courses using the Blackboard Learning Management System. Some online courses may require visits to campus for labs or exams. Students should have good computer skills and be very self-disciplined to be successful in online courses.

Hybrid Courses

Hybrid Courses are courses in which some traditional face-to-face time has been replaced by online learning activities. The purpose of a hybrid course is to take advantage of the best features of both face-to-face and online learning. When registering for Hybrid Courses, students must select both the classroom lecture section as well as the online lab section.



Academic and Technical Programs

Academic Programs

This Division is responsible for scheduling and administering the courses that transfer to four-year institutions, allied health programs that lead to certification or licensure, non-credit continuing courses, online courses, and courses conducted for dual credit in area high schools.

Lamar State College Port Arthur offers general academic courses leading to Associate of Arts and Associate Arts in Teaching degrees.

The courses in these degrees are designed to transfer to four-year institutions and include accounting, art, biology, business, computer science, chemistry, criminal justice, drama, economics, education, English, geography, geology, government, history, mathematics, music, physical education, physics, psychology, speech and sociology.

Technical Programs

The Technical Programs Division programs are designed to provide students with the knowledge and skills necessary for employment in business and industry.

Lamar State College Port Arthur offers technical programs in fields that include allied health, business, industry, music, nursing, and art.

Students who complete a technical education program earn an Associate of Applied Science (AAS) degree or a certificate. AAS degrees take approximately two years to complete and include technical courses and some general education courses.

General education courses include courses in humanities, communication, mathematics, and social awareness. Certificate degree programs include technical courses and take approximately one or two semesters to complete.

Liquefied Natural Gas Manufacturing

The Advanced Technical Certificate in Liquefied Natural Gas (LNG) Manufacturing includes the knowledge and skills required to succeed in a liquefied natural gas manufacturing facility.

Topics include equipment, operations, LNG properties, LNG storage and operations, principles of refrigeration, safety, state and federal regulations, and gas plant operations.

The Advanced Technical Certificate is designed for individuals who have an Associate of Applied Science Degree in Process Technology or an equivalent. Extensive experience in a related field may be used in lieu of a degree.

According to the most recent occupational employment numbers from the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the median wage for gas plant operators in Texas is \$68,690 a year. Texas leads the nation in the number of jobs offered in this field.

The Liquefied Natural Gas Manufacturing Certificate takes a year to complete. Those students interested in this advanced certificate must already possess an associate's degree in Process Technology or an equivalent degree. Extensive experience in a related field may be used in lieu of a degree.

Lamar State College Port Arthur offers in-depth studies into Process Technology and Instrumentation Technology with opportunities for internships at the region's many petrochemical companies.





Title V: Developing Hispanic Serving Institution

Title V: Camino a la Excelencia



Pathway to Excellence: 'Camino a la Excelencia'

The LSCPA Title V Grant project, Pathway to Excellence, expands upon the College's mission as a learning-centered institution that embraces academic excellence by providing multiple pathways to student success.

The Pathway to Excellence project is comprised of two main goals, to increase access to higher education and student success in higher education, for all students in the community.

A particular focus is placed on Hispanic, low-income and first generation (high-need) students at critical points in the two-year and four-year pipeline.



The Excelencia Center will be located in the Ruby Fuller Center, which is being renovated thanks to a \$6.32 million legislative grant. The funding will provide for a modern interior space and major repairs to the exterior of the building. The current classroom addition will be removed, allowing for a grand secondary entrance to the building. Once the renovations are completed, plans include locating classes, faculty, and student support services into the building.





Partnership with Rice University provides free textbooks for faculty, students

LSCPA is one of 12 schools chosen by Rice University to participate in the OpenStax Institutional Partnership Network. As a participant in the network's first-year program, LSCPA will work to encourage greater use of free, flexible textbooks among its faculty and students.

What that means, in short, is that students and faculty will enjoy the free use of textbooks starting with the Fall 2021 semester.

LSCPA was chosen by Rice University to participate in this strategic partnership with OpenStax by demonstrating an eagerness to drive adoption of open educational resources (OER). Free to access and fully modifiable, OER provides students and educators with fair and flexible teaching and learning materials.

More than a dozen faculty members at Lamar State College Port Arthur have eagerly volunteered to participate in the program. Once the conversion process is completed with a target start date of Fall 2021, a student would be able to complete nearly the entire core curriculum, needing only to purchase one book that costs about \$100. Ultimately, even that one remaining course is being targeted to be converted to the OpenStax partnership, meaning the entire core curriculum textbook requirement would cost nothing.

On average, the institutions who join the network increase the number of students impacted by OER by 158





percent after completing the first year. To date, the program has resulted in over 20 million dollars of additional student savings from OER.

Open educational resources, including the free, openly licensed textbooks offered by OpenStax, eliminate cost barriers for students and allow unrestricted, immediate access to learning materials, increasing the likelihood for students to complete their courses successfully. In addition to the immediate benefits to students, open educational resources are offered under a Creative Commons license, allowing instructors to modify textbooks to better serve their unique teaching and evolving student needs.



Workforce Training & Continuing Education

The Workforce Training and Continuing Education Department offers training designed to provide educational opportunities that maximize workforce performance, career development, and self-enrichment.

The goal of the Workforce Training and Continuing Education Department is to assist individuals, businesses, industries, and the community to meet their training and educational needs. All training events are intended to enrich, strengthen, and support participating students.

Based upon community interest and need, training helps students upgrade their skills, increase their knowledge, learn a new hobby, advance their careers, solve problems, and stimulate their minds.

Specialized Training

LSCPA designs and plans workforce training tailored to meet businesses' unique needs. Specialized training schedules are designed to meet employee participants' schedules at convenient times and locations on-campus, off-campus or on-site.

Training will allow employers to up-skill workers and keep current with changing technology in such industries as petrochemical, manufacturing, and general business.

Building a Better Future for Southeast Texas

\$4.8M grant renovates Armory into Craft Training Facility

Lamar State College Port Arthur received a \$4.8 million grant that, with additional local matching funds, will reach \$6 million to help renovate the existing Armory building, located along Lakeshore Drive. The grant is part of the U.S. Commerce Department's Economic Development Administration (EDA) efforts to help the State of Texas prepare for natural disasters and promote economic resiliency and business growth.

The cavernous three-story building on Lakeshore Drive alongside the LSCPA softball field has stood mostly vacant for nearly a decade. The occasional welding class and dressing rooms for the Seahawks softball team have made the building home.

The Armory, so named because it was once used by the U.S. military prior to being donated to the college, will soon become home to a state-of-the-art craft training facility that will provide education opportunities to help local residents get well-paying jobs quickly. The grant's intent is to serve as a job catalyst to support the economic recovery in an area impacted by Hurricane Harvey. The project is expected to create 167 jobs.

Once the 23,000 square foot building is retrofitted, the college will be able to offer training in welding, scaffold building, pipefitting, rigging, structural steel, electrical, instrumentation, carpentry, concrete work, and a wide variety of safety training.

The College will be partnering with Bechtel Engineering to offer five different craft apprenticeships. Once students complete their College training, they will be interviewed by Bechtel. Those hired will proceed into 1,000 hours of paid on-the-job-training. At the completion of their apprenticeship they will enter the workforce just one step below a Journeyman.

The City of Port Arthur's Economic Development Corporation is contributing \$1 million toward the matching fund requirement, while Bechtel is donating equipment to cover the additional matching amount. With the initial grant, the total investment will be \$6 million.

These projects are all funded under the Bipartisan Budget Act of 2018 in which Congress appropriated to EDA \$600 million in additional Economic Adjustment Assistance Program funds for disaster relief and recovery as a result of Hurricanes Harvey, Irma, and Maria, wildfires, and other calendar year 2017 natural disasters under the Stafford Act.



Dual Credit Courses

Dual Credit is an opportunity for high school students to earn high school and college credit simultaneously. Students demonstrating college readiness through a college placement exam can earn college and high school credits in the same course by attending classes at their high school, on the Lamar State College Port Arthur campus, and/or online.

Dual Credit Curriculum

Dual credit courses include opportunities for academic courses designed to meet the core curriculum requirements and for transfer to four-year colleges or universities.

Technical courses are designed to satisfy requirements for Certificate and Associate of Applied Science degrees and are part of the Texas Workforce Education Course Manual.

Over the last few decades, the drafting, design, and manufacturing industries have become heavily computerized.

The Computer-Aided Drafting program is structured to prepare a segment of the workforce to compete for jobs in these industries.

The Computer-Aided Drafting certificate program prepares students with the skills necessary to become engineering and architectural drafters. Students will qualify for jobs working in the modern design process with engineers, architects, detail drafters, and manufacturers.

Early College High School

Early College High Schools (ECHS) are institutions that allow those least likely to attend college an opportunity receive both a high school diploma and either an associate degree or at least 60 credit hours toward a baccalaureate degree.

Lamar State College Port Arthur and Port Arthur ISD joined forces in 2017 to open Woodrow Wilson ECHS. In Spring 2020, Wilson ECHS graduated its first-ever class.

Paying For College

Paying Tuition

Tuition and fees are subject to change based on the Texas State University System, LSCPA policies and/or state and federal regulations.

Payment of Fees

A student is not registered until all fees are paid in full or the student has been approved for an installment plan.

Payment Options

In Person. The Cashier's Office is located in the Business Office on Procter Street. Regular business hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday. The Cashier's Office is closed from noon to 1 p.m.

By Mail. Send check or money order to the address below. You must include your student ID number (P number) on your check or money order. Cashier's Office, Lamar State College Port Arthur, P.O. Box 310, Port Arthur, TX 77642.

Web System. Students can pay their tuition and fees by check or credit card online through their My.LamarPA. edu account and use Self Service. LSCPA accepts American Express, VISA, Discover, or MasterCard. Students may obtain an account balance by going to www.lamarpa.edu. Follow the instructions to locate the account balance and make payment.

Payment Deadlines

Students are responsible for paying tuition and fees prior to the deadline date. Students who fail to meet payment deadlines will be dropped from their courses.

Students may obtain account balance information on BANNER Self Service.

Payment Amounts

Payment in full. Students that have paid all their tuition and fees for a semester will be registered for classes in that semester.

More than 50 percent of tuition and fees paid.

Students who pay more than 50 percent but less than 100 percent of their tuition and fees for a semester will be placed on the Installment Payment Plan.

Less than 50 percent of tuition and fees paid.

Students who pay less than 50 percent of their tuition and fees for a semester will be dropped from all classes.

Installment Payment Option

Students may enter into an installment contract with the college (during the fall and spring semesters only). Any payment for an amount less than the full balance of the account constitutes an acceptance of an installment contract with the college. Drop and/or withdrawal refunds for students using the installment plan are calculated as a percentage of the total tuition and fees assessed, not as a percentage of any partial payments.

If a class is added after a student is placed on installments, the student is responsible for 100 percent of the tuition and fees for the added class. The tuition and fees for the added class must be paid before the payment date listed in the calendar.



Other Financial Resources for Students

Students with Disabilities

The Texas Workforce Commission/Workforce Solutions offers help with tuition and non-refundable fees to students who have disabilities, provided their vocational objectives have been approved by their vocational rehabilitation counselor. Services are available to help students with disabilities become employable. Application for services should be made at the Workforce Solutions - Port Arthur Office, 4680 Hwy 365, Port Arthur, TX 77642, (409) 962-1236 and Workforce Solutions - Beaumont Office, 510 Park, Suite 100, Beaumont, TX, 77701, (409) 839-8045 or www.setworks.org.

Valedictorians

Valedictorians from accredited Texas high schools are entitled to an exemption from payment of tuition for the two regular semesters immediately following graduation.

Fees are not exempt. During registration, valedictorians should report to the Admissions Office for fee adjustments. The names of valedictorians of all Texas high schools are certified by principals to the Texas Education Agency. The college receives the list for reference.

Student Employment

Employment opportunities are available through the College Work-Study to LSCPA students as part of the financial assistance program. Work-Study allows students to earn money to help with educational expenses while working on campus. These jobs provide valuable work experience, with flexible hours. Students can work up to 20 hours a week.

To receive college work-study funds, students have to apply for Financial Aid at www.fafsa.gov and also turn in all required documents to the Financial Aid Office. Students must be enrolled in at least six hours and must meet the requirements of Satisfactory Academic Progress, students must have at least a 2.0 GPA and have course completion rate of 70 percent. To apply, please visit the Human Resources Office.

Local businesses and industries provide a number of part-time and full-time jobs which allow students to earn part or all of these expenses while attending the college. Students can look on the Texas Workforce Commission website at twc.texas.gov/jobseekers.



Applying for Financial Aid

- 1. LSCPA requires all students applying for grants, loans or college work-study employment to file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) to determine their degree of need. Processing takes three to five weeks, so students planning to meet the April 1 deadline should file their applications by October 1. Dependent students will need their parent's most current federal tax return and income information. We recommend using the IRS Data Retrieval System.
- 2. Students will check the email account provided by the college and should promptly respond to all requests from the LSCPA FINANCIAL AID OFFICE. Applications will not be completed until all necessary forms are received. Once this process has been completed, students will be emailed an award notification if in good academic standing.
- 3. Students must meet enrollment requirements:
 - A student must be enrolled at least half-time (six hours) during each semester to be considered for most federal and state financial aid programs.

- Students enrolled for less than half-time enrollment status will be considered for the Federal Pell Grants only.
- · Financial aid is initially awarded based on full-time enrollment for the fall and spring semesters (halftime for the summer semesters) and will be adjusted to the student's actual enrollment.
- A student must be in a degree-seeking or eligible certificate program and taking courses for credit hours applicable towards a degree to be considered for financial assistance. Financial aid may be paid for repeated coursework previously taken in the program but may not include more than one repetition of a previously passed course.
- A student must have received credentials, earned a high school diploma, GED or completed a stateaccredited approved homeschool program.
- 5. Students should log into their My.LamarPA.edu account and click on the Financial Aid Applicant Link to monitor their financial aid status or view/accept awards.

The college will continue to award aid as long as funds are available. However, the most desirable types of aid are normally expended early. Therefore, students should make every effort to meet the January 15 application deadline. Applicants who are high school seniors should meet the January 15 deadline to be given first priority.

Students should complete their FAFSA by January 1. This is the state priority deadline for identifying eligible students to be given priority in receiving awards through state financial aid programs.

The FAFSA and any required documents need to be submitted by April 1 to allow for prompt packaging of financial aid awards. By submitting all documentation by priority dates, students will be packaged for financial aid before the semester begins.

To qualify for scholarships, you must:

- Have applied and been accepted to LSCPA.
- Have at least a 2.5 overall GPA.
- Be enrolled in at least 6 hours (part-time scholarship are available).

Gates Memorial Library

The Gates Memorial Library is a two-story Classical Revival building that was entered into the National Register of Historic Places in 1981.

The library includes a 47-station open student computer lab, a quiet study carrel area, group study areas, a periodical reading room, extensive stack areas, individual audiovisual rooms, a multi-purpose conference room and expanded reference and access services areas.

Plenty of soft seating inside the library complements an idyllic outside fountain garden surrounded by year-around patio seating. The online public access catalog is available 24 hours a day on or off campus and is part of a system that automates the major library components.

Materials are accessible in many formats, including paper, videotapes, DVDs, CD-ROMs and the internet. Through password authentication, students and faculty have continuous access to the library's vast electronic holdings, from anywhere on or off campus. The total volume count numbers more than 60,000 and an e-book collection provides an additional 45,000 titles. The total periodical count numbers more than 30,000 subscriptions in both paper and electronic formats.

Meningitis Vaccine Requirements

Students applying to Lamar State College Port Arthur must have had a bacterial meningitis vaccine.

A student who has been admitted to an institution of higher education, or private or independent institution of higher education, must show evidence of receipt of an initial bacterial meningitis vaccination dose or booster during the five-year period preceding and at least 10 days prior to the first day of the first semester in which the student initially enrolls at an institution, or following a break in enrollment of at least one fall or spring semester at the same or another institution.

A student is exempt from the bacterial meningitis vaccine if the student meets any of the following criteria:

- 1. The student is 22 years of age or older by the first day of the start of the semester; or
- 2. The student is enrolled in a continuing education course or program that is less than 360 contact hours, or continuing education corporate training; or
- 3. The student is enrolled in a dual credit course which is taught at a public or private K-12 facility not located on a higher education institution campus; or
- 4. The student is incarcerated in a Texas prison.

2021 Vaccination Deadlines

Spring: January 9, 2021

Summer I: May 28, 2021

Summer II: July 3, 2021

Summer III: May 28, 2021

- 5. An affidavit or certificate signed by a physician who is duly registered and licensed to practice medicine in the United States, stating that in the physician's opinion, the vaccination would be injurious to the health and wellbeing of the student; or
- 6. An affidavit signed by the student stating that the student declines the vaccination for reasons of conscience, including a religious belief. A conscientious exemption form from the Texas Department of State Health Services must be used: or
- 7. Confirmation that the student has completed the internet-based Texas Department of State Health Services to claim an exemption for reasons of conscience (for entering students at public junior colleges only).



Title IX Protections

Sexual misconduct is a form of sex discrimination and will not be tolerated. Lamar State College Port Arthur will maintain an environment that promotes prompt reporting of all types of sexual misconduct and timely and fair resolution of sexual misconduct complaints. LSCPA will take prompt and appropriate action to eliminate sexual misconduct when such is committed, prevent its recurrence, and remedy its effects.

Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 prohibits discrimination on the basis of sex in educational programs and activities. Sexual harassment of students or employees, which includes acts of sexual violence, is a form of sex discrimination prohibited by Title IX.

Lamar State College Port Arthur is committed to creating an environment free of harassment and discrimination.

Training Requirement

Congress passed legislation that requires new students at all colleges and universities to complete training on sexual assault and violence prevention prior to attending class. All new and transfer LSCPA students must complete the online Title IX/Clegy Act Training Course prior to registering for class.

Once a new student is admitted, a link to the online

training course "Think about It" from Campus Clarity is sent to the student's My.LamarPA.edu email account. Each student must complete the training course before registering for classes. Failure to complete this training will impact a student's ability to register for classes. 'Think about it' takes approximately two-and-a-half hours to complete. The training course allows the student to work at their own pace and leave the course to return at a later time. When the student returns to the training session, the course will open to the page where you stopped. Upon completion, students should print a Certificate of Completion. LSCPA is also notified when a student successfully completes the course.
